an expanded edition of hickey s controversial and exquisitely written apologia for beauty championed by artists reviled by art critics and as powerful as ever 30 years on 1993 pandemic rages through yet another decade leaving society and the arts devastated a dave hickey sits down to produce a slim volume the invisible dragon the book ignites a firestorm and from its ashes beauty again rises as a dominant force in artistic life academics argue about theoretical minutiae artists pass the book around like a samizdat this 30th anniversary edition brings back into print dragon s four essays on beauty and commingling them with five previously uncollected essays hickey s 1974 profile of dolly parton anti-dolly s longevity as a cultural and feminist icon his appreciation of richard pryor weave elegiac tapestry his review of john rechy s seminal gay novel numbers outs its literary innovation in the face of a homophobia that otherwise ghettoized it and his singular edited ruscha a paragon of arts writing by an extraordinary prose stylist enjoins us to listen not just look at it an afterword by hickey s friend and dragon s editor queers the brass heterosexual gambler as it situates the creation of dragon squarely within the aids pandemic the book was in part an attempt to make beauty visible under the looming presence of aging and bodily decay only now can we fully appreciate how artists continue to harness beauty as a source of meaning and joy dave hickey 1938 2021 was one of the preeminent arts and culture writers of the turn of the 21st century a macarthur genius fellow known as the beauty king in the popular press hickey opened a clean well lighted place gallery in austin texas in 1970 before becoming executive editor at art in america magazine in the 1970s he was a socialite in nashville tennessee where he coined and helped create the outlaw country music movement by the 1990s hickey had made a home in las vegas from where he regularly traveled to perform with audiences worldwide 18 essays and poems on the importance of representation in literature fiction and fantasy with an introduction by author k tempest bradford proceeds from the essays of this collection go to the carl brandon society to support con or bust key texts on beauty and its revival in contemporary art between june 2014 and april 2015 dave hickey posted 100 000 digital comments on social media prompting nearly 700 000 words in response from

lovers acolytes and skeptics wasted words is an unedited comprehensive transcript of exchanges this polyphonic digital discourse reveals the range of hickey s strong opinions he embarks on a crypto enlightenment project for the benefit of dunces and pricks da s digital writings highlight the impact of digital technology on culture while allowing an intimate glimpse of their author these writings reveal the well known critic in a creative informal rather than critical formal mode not only do they flesh out many of the ideas elucidated in hickey s essays on art but they also cover a variety of topics including the 1972 texas eagle scouts and hickey s own academic misadventures this book was published on the occasion of the exhibition ken price sculpture a retrospective which was organized at the los angeles county museum of art exhibition itinerary los angeles county museum of art september 16 2012 january 6 2013 nasher sculpture center february 9 2013 may 12 2013 metropolitan museum of art june 18 september 22 2013 poetry as our material face the world threatened from so many directions slips into potentially infinite virtual spaces where have we gone this slippage has happened suddenly worldwide and we do not know whether it renders humankind irrelevant serves as an escape from apocalyptic problems or is to be welcomed as a new direction for human life for strickland poetry shares with mathematics and code a proclivity for extreme semantic condensation within a formalized language structure and is thus her chosen instrument to track this enormous increasingly invisible dragon in the room stalking our time in this book the founder of object oriented ontology develops his view that aesthetics is the central discipline of philosophy whereas science attempts to grasp an object in terms of its observable qualities philosophy and art cannot proceed in this way because they don t have direct access to their objects hence philosophy shares the same fate as art in being compelled to communicate indirectly allusively or elliptically rather than in the clear propositional terms that are often taken wrongly to be the sole stuff of genuine philosophy conceiving of philosophy and art in this way allows us to reread key debates in aesthetic theory and to view art history in a different way the formalist criticism of greenberg and fried is rejected for its refusal to embrace the innate theatrical and deep multiplicity of every artwork this has consequences for art criticism making content more important than formalism thinks but less entwined with the social sphere anti formalism holds it has consequences for art history too as the surrealists david la poussin among others gain in importance the close link between aesthetics and ontology invites a new periodization of modern philosophy as a whole and the habitual turn away from kant s thing in itself towards an increase in philosophical immanence is shown to be a dawn this major work will be of great interest to students and scholars of philosophy aesthetics art history and cultural theory this book provides original descriptive accounts of two schools of thought in the philosophy of beauty the 20th century anti aesthetic movement and the 21st century beauty revival movement it also includes a positive defence of beauty as lived experience extrapolated from beauty revival position beauty was traditionally understood in the broadest sense as a notion that engages our sense perception and embraces everything evoked by that perception including mental products and affective states this book compares and places in parallel with one another the anti aesthetic and beauty revival movements the author s view anti aestheticism is devoted to a decisive negation of beauty denying its

importance as a philosophical notion and its significance as a lived experience it suggests beauty is a merely sensual experience which can be used at best as a distraction from and at worst as an instrument of evil alternatively the beauty revival movement advances arguments for beauty as an experience that extends primarily to sensual experience but also calls forth mental products and cognitive and affective states evoked by that experience after reconstructing these two positions the author elaborates on the notion of beauty as a lived experience through three key moments which occur in the process of our experiencing beautiful objects these moments are a the conditions that constitute an experience of beauty b the attitudinal features most likely to lead to the experience of beauty and c the results of the experience of beauty the revival of beauty will be of interest to scholars and advanced students working in aesthetics history of philosophy and art history divine beauty is a gentle but powerful call to awaken o donohue opens our eyes hearts and minds to the wonder of our own relationship with beauty rather than covering this theme he uncovers it exposing the richness and mystery of its breadth his words return us home to the dignity of silence the profound stillness the power of thought and perception and the eternal grace and generosity of its presence in this masterful and revelatory work o donohue encourages our greater intimacy with beauty and celebrates it for what it really is a homecoming of the human spirit a work that focuses on the classical medieval and celtic traditions on art music literature nature and language o donohue reveals how beauty s invisible embrace invites us towards new heights of passion and creativity divine beauty is an exquisite treasury of forms of the beautiful its surface employs narrative image anecdote and myth while into the silence of its subtlety sown seeds of reflection that gradually blossom in the heart millions of readers adore christopher paolini s inheritance cycle its earnest hero its breathtaking battles and of course its awe inspiring dragon saphira but there s so much more to the series than meets the eye secrets of the dragon riders edited by today s second hottest dragon writer james a cory is a must read for readers what they re missing why might roran be the real hero of the inheritance cycle does paolini s writing have in common with role play games and modern action films and why do teenage writers judged more harshly than their adult counterparts the ya authors in secrets of the dragon riders some of them no older than paolini when he wrote eragon each take a different aspect of the series to engage and entertain paolini fans broken stars edited by award winning writer ken liu translator of the bestselling and hugo award winning novel the three body problem by acclaimed chinese author cixin liu is his second thought provoking anthology of chinese short speculative fiction some of the included authors are already familiar to readers in the west liu cixin and hao jingfang both hugo winners some are publishing in english for the first time because of the growing interest in newer sff from china virtually every story here was first published in chinese in the 2010s the stories span from short shorts to novellas and evoke every hue on the emotional spectrum besides the firmly entrenched in subgenres familiar to western sff readers such as hard sf cyberpunk science fantasy and space opera the anthology also includes stories that showcase deep connections to chinese culture alternate chinese history chuanyue time travel satire with historical and contemporary allusions that are likely unknown to the average western reader while the anthology makes no claim or attempt to be representative or comprehensive it demonstrates
